Directions:

In groups or by yourself (maximum group size is 4), you will create a timeline that provides both visual and written representation of the following events/concepts of the Cold War.

Requirements:

1. You must include **12** of the **Key words** above if you are working **alone**, and include **ALL 22 words** if you are working with a **partner/group**. Use your notes, assignments, book (especially Chapter 26) and online research for information about the key words.
2. Key words must go in the correct chronological order and include the correct dates of the duration of each event/topic underneath each term. Order them in chronological order of when they began.
3. For each key word, you must include a picture, or drawing representation
4. For each key word, you must include a thermometer colored in to a certain range, hot being the most intense (think Cuban Missile Crisis), cold the least. Then in your paragraphs, include an explanation of why this event matches the intensity of your chosen temperature.
5. Be as specific as you can. Aim for an A and include the following aspects:
 - C = Will only write about the: Who, What, When, Where, How, Why, and explain your rank on the thermometer.
 - B = Will write about the: Who, What, When, Where, How, Why, explain your rank on the thermometer for each event, plus discuss the significance or importance of the event/topic in history.
 - A = Will write about the: Who, What, When, Where, How, Why, explain your rank on the thermometer for each event, discuss the significance or importance of the event/topic in history, and explain the legacy or impact of the event today
 - The more information displayed in your timeline or brochure the more you can earn for completeness.
6. Include your Name, and Title on the front of your project
7. Include a Bibliography/Work Cited page in MLA Format on the last page of the timeline. You must use at least 5 sources on this project, you likely will have many more.
8. Neatness, Color, No Pencil, Good information, and Use of all key terms, are all important to maximize your grade!
